

Dear Commissioners,

First of all as we all know, we can't pick our relatives. I happen to be the Great, Great grandson of Captain Charles Carroll White of the 10th South Carolina Infantry Regiment, Company A (Georgetown Rifle Guards) As a military soldier, he had a pretty distinguished career being promoted from Sargent to Captain during his service time from 1861 to July 1864. His Military career ended when he was wounded during the Atlanta Campaign and fortunately he did not die from his wounds. Second of all, it should be noted I was born and raised in Niagara Falls, New York 72 years ago. So back in 1861 I would be considered a "Yankee" by my southern relatives. Again, we can't pick our relatives.

I think to myself; would my Great, Great grandfather want me, **on his behalf**, to help preserve the Confederate Monument within the Arlington Cemetery? Also I ask myself; who visits this section of Arlington Cemetery where 400 Confederate soldiers are buried? The answer to these questions is: 1.) Yes, I think my Great, Great grandfather would want me to help preserve the Confederate Monument and 2.) I think the people who visit this section of the Arlington Cemetery are either relatives of Confederate Soldiers or people who are interested in History or just want to, in general, pay their respects to soldiers who died in wars.

When we see war documentaries on television where ex-soldiers from different wars (WW2, Korean, Viet Nam, Gulf, Iraq and Afghanistan) are interviewed it's almost invariable that they say that they were fighting for their fellow soldier next to them. Of course they knew there was a "bigger cause" for the war they were in but when they were in battle, they were fighting for the man next to him. The "bigger cause" as they like to say today was "above their pay grade". They fought for each other! All soldiers in all wars do including the Civil War.

I want to remind the Arlington Cemetery Advisory Commissioners that all wars are not "just". (Example: Indian Wars.) The reason I bring this up is because my wife's Uncle, Peter Martin who was Mohawk- Native American, is buried in Arlington Cemetery due to his military service who served in WW2, Korea & Viet Nam. If my wife's Indian Uncle was able to be recognized with a headstone monument in Arlington National Cemetery; then why tear down the Confederate Monument? Weren't the Native Americans in the west considered enemies of the United States during the Indian Wars? Food for thought! ...

Quite frankly, I think it's shameful that you the Advisory Commissioners are even discussing the potential removal of this Confederate Monument. Haven't the "woke" individuals of this country **already done enough damage** by creating a divisive atmosphere

through out our "United" States? It's ironic knowing that President Woodrow Wilson in 1914 dedicated the Confederate Memorial at Arlington seeing that today he is considered the first real progressive president of the 20th century.

Also, if more U.S. Citizens knew the history of how Arlington National Cemetery was created, they would be utterly discussed. ... History: When Robert E. Lee's wife, Mary Anna Custis Lee, tried to have her cousin, Philip Fendall, pay the property taxes (\$92.07) on time, the US Government refused to accept from her cousin the payment because the payment had to be paid by her in person. It must be noted that Mrs. Robert E. Lee was ill during this time. Due to the U.S. Government not accepting the property tax payment from her cousin, the U.S. government acquired the Arlington estate at a tax sale in 1864. Robert E. Lee died in 1870 but Mrs. Lee wanted her property back. Her son, G.W. Custis Lee worked through lawyers to try and get the property returned. Unfortunately Mrs. Robert E. Lee died in November of 1873 and was never able to see her beloved Arlington House returned to her. It was only after Robert Todd Lincoln, the only surviving son of the president, helped Custis Lee sue the U.S. Government and it went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court on December 4 1882 where the court found in a 5 to 4 decision that the property had been confiscated without due process. After Custis Lee won his case against the U.S. Government, he sold the property to the U.S. Government in a deed signing ceremony on March 31, 1883 with Robert Todd Lincoln in attendance. It should be noted that Robert Todd Lincoln was Secretary of War at this time.

So in closing, I think Arlington National Cemetery has had enough controversy through it's existence. Leave history alone by leaving the Confederate Monument alone. Ask yourselves: What would Robert Todd Lincoln advise? For that matter, what would presidents William McKinley and Woodrow Wilson advise? And what would all the soldiers say who are buried in Arlington soil including my wife's Uncle Peter?



I believe that these removals and the movement to do so are aimed to undermine our country and national unity. This needs to stop.


In every war, especially a war between brothers, lasting peace and unity can only be achieved if our submitting enemies are allowed their heroes and honor for their troops.



I am submitting this statement because I oppose the Naming Commissions recommendation to remove the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery.

I oppose removal of the memorial. Confederates, we're told, were all evil racist traitors, and the only reason there's a memorial for them at Arlington is because other racists, who came later, put it up because they were mad about losing the Civil War and wanted to keep white supremacy going. And anyway, the only people who would object to renaming military bases and removing memorials are present-day racists whose opinions don't count. *Right?*

That well-worn narrative, embedded in the discourse at this point, not only distorts history but obscures the deeper truth our history reveals, which is that we've become a deranged, small-minded, angry people. Removing war memorials from military cemeteries is what societies do when they're imploding on themselves, when the bonds of civic life have all but disappeared along with any notion of a shared past, to say nothing of a common vision for the future.

It was not always this way. At the turn of the last century, our political leaders seemed to understand that the survival of a vast republic like ours depended on civic virtues that include reconciliation, forgiveness, and actual tolerance. They knew this because many of them had lived through and participated in the Civil War. They had seen and felt for themselves what happens when a nation turns on itself, and they were determined not to let it happen again.

Ironically, the history of the Confederate memorial at Arlington is a perfect case in point. It was first conceived of by President William McKinley, a decorated Union veteran who saw combat at Antietam and in the Shenandoah Valley. During his presidential campaign in 1896, he witnessed untended Confederate graves in the South, and it disturbed him. At the time, the federal government prohibited the decoration of Confederate graves at Arlington, as it had since the end of the Civil War.

McKinley thought it was time for that to change. At a peace jubilee in December 1898 celebrating the end of the Spanish-American War (the first time since before the Civil War that Americans from both North and South were engaged in a military conflict with a foreign power), McKinley announced that the government would henceforth tend to the graves of Confederate dead buried in federal cemeteries, saying they represented a "tribute to American valor."

The speech prompted calls to disinter Confederate remains at Arlington, which were dispersed throughout the cemetery and mingled with Union graves and rebury them in a specially designated Confederate section. Congress drafted legislation and provided funding, and McKinley signed the bill in June 1900.

The legislation didn't mention a memorial, but the plans for the Confederate section laid out graves in a circular pattern around a cruciform set of walkways with a central grassy area that the Army Corps of Engineers marked on the plans with an "M," for memorial.

It would take another 14 years for private groups (including Union veteran organizations) to raise the money and erect the Confederate memorial that stands in Arlington today. Anyone who has seen it knows that it reflects the sentiments of reconciliation and national unity that McKinley originally had in mind.

The memorial's central figure is a woman, meant to represent the South, crowned with an olive wreath, a symbol of peace. In her extended left hand is a laurel wreath and in her right hand is a pruning hook, which rests upon a plow. Under the figure is an inscription, a quote from the Book of Isaiah, "And they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks."

That is to say, the monument's central theme is reconciliation and peace — beating swords into ploughshares. It commends the South for turning away from war while also honoring their war dead.

Critics will note how the Latin inscription on the monument's base contains a reference to the "lost cause," as if that somehow vitiates the overarching purpose and theme of the work. It does not. Authentic reconciliation, after all, involves some degree of compromise, and at the time — within a living generation of Civil War combat — it was enough for North and South to declare together that sectionalism was done and that the country would bind up its wounds and be united again.

There is only one reason to remove the monument now, in 2022, and it has nothing to do with past or racial reconciliation and everything to do with wielding political power in the present.

Not that any of this should come as a surprise. Forging actual unity in times of civil strife requires more circumspection and humility than our leaders today can muster. McKinley, who in his youth had actually fought Confederate soldiers, watched them kill and maim his comrades, was nevertheless able to reconcile and forgive — and urge the nation to do likewise.

Today we enjoy prosperity and comfort unimaginable to Americans of McKinley's time. Yet we have precious little of the gratitude, generosity, and grace he was able to show his erstwhile enemies. But then, McKinley did not live in a dying civilization.

I was born and raised in Cleveland, Ohio. I served 20 years in the Air Force, enlisting at age 17 right out of high school. I retired as an officer. After my retirement, I began genealogy research into my family and was surprised to find that every member of my family, but one has served in the military for the last six generations. My grandfather died in a veterans' hospital in Tennessee after being gassed in World War I. My third-great-grandfather was a drummer with the 13th South Carolina Infantry during the Civil War. His father, my fourth-great-grandfather died of pneumonia following the Battle of Fredericksburg and was buried in a mass grave in Richmond's Oakland Cemetery. He served with the 3rd Infantry, South Carolina Volunteers. None of my family members were slave owners. They were all patriots who fought for freedom, self-determination, honor, and to protect their homes and families. I resent and abhor any

suggestion that they don't deserve to be recognized for their service because they fought for the wrong side in the Civil War.

I am offended and outraged by the recommendation that the "reconciliation memorial" be removed from Arlington National Cemetery and ask the Cemetery Commission to reject it. What is next? Removal of the Confederate graves?

I am adamantly opposed to removing the "Reconciliation" memorial inside of our nation's most sacred burial ground, Arlington National Cemetery, which was put there to REUNITE our nation.

What in the world are people thinking today! It is disgraceful and dishonorable to even consider such a thing.

Over 750,000 soldiers died in the War Between the States and over a million were maimed.

This is what historian James McPherson wrote about the Southern mortality rate in his book *Crossroads of Freedom: Antietam*:

[T]he overall mortality rate for the South exceeded that of any country in World War I and that of all but the region between the Rhine and the Volga in World War II.

Our country came back together as evidenced by things like the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery, which was the idea of U.S. President William McKinley who was a sergeant in the Union Army during the war. As you know, Arlington National Cemetery comes from the estate of Robert E. Lee's family.

President Woodrow Wilson in his address "Accepting the Monument in Memory of the Confederate Dead at Arlington National Cemetery," June 4, 1914, states that he is "profoundly aware of the solemn significance" of the memorial and he goes on:

It was proposed by a President of the United States who had himself been a distinguished officer in the Union Army. It was authorized by an act of Congress of the United States. The corner Stone of the monument was laid by a President of the United States elevated to his position by the votes of the party which had chiefly prided itself upon sustaining the war for the Union.

The descendants of those reconciled Confederate soldiers all fought ENTHUSIASTICALLY for our reunited country in every war. Alvin York, Audie Murphy and others are legendary American soldiers from the South along with millions and millions of others over the years. United States Army recruiting has always been better in the "Patriotic" South than anywhere in the country. Ask your

Army recruiters which region of America is most enthusiastic for military service and they will tell you without question: THE SOUTH.

President Eisenhower kept a picture of Robert E. Lee in his White House office during his presidency and said Lee was one of the finest men our country has ever produced.

Eisenhower said that the issues of secession, states rights, etc. were not settled in those days, and they were not. New England threatened to secede five times before the South finally did. The Hartford Convention of New England was truly a traitorous affair because it was during the War of 1812 but nobody is suggesting we remove monuments to New England soldiers.

We also would never suggest removing monuments to soldiers from New York and Boston even though those ports slave traded the entire time – much of it illegally – that slavery existed.

'The number of persons engaged in the slave-trade, and the amount of capital embarked in it, exceed our powers of calculation. The city of New York has been until of late [1862] the principal port of the world for this infamous commerce; although the cities of Portland and Boston are only second to her in that distinction. Slave dealers added largely to the wealth of our commercial metropolis; they contributed liberally to the treasuries of political organizations, and their bank accounts were largely depleted to carry elections in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Connecticut.'

Dear Mr. Davis,

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the commission's recommendation that the Reconciliation Memorial at Arlington National Cemetery be removed. As a lifelong Virginia resident, the indirect descendant of a solider who died during the Siege of Petersburg, and a student of Southern history (admittedly amateur). I want to tell you that I consider the proposed removal to be nothing short of grave desecration and a profound and obscene insult to the tens of thousands of young men - most of them poor, most of them venturing away from home for the first time, many of them teenagers - who fought and died to preserve what they viewed as their homeland - the Commonwealth of Virginia. I am sure that the men - and boys - from other states who served in the armies led by Lee, Johnston, and others, felt the same way: they were fighting to preserve their own native lands, their states, from aggression. Altogether, perhaps as many as 300,000 personnel from the Confederate States Army died during the conflict, often in the most hideous manners possible - on operating tables without anesthesia, crying out for water (or their mothers) in the no man's land between armies, dying of typhoid, malaria and influenza in deliberately squalid prisoner of war camps. As historian Paul Johnson put it, the only thing that mattered to these men - and entire South in the end - was the war. It had to be fought and it had to be won. The "root causes" were long forgotten. It was a war against what they perceived to be the annihilation of their homelands. Again, as another noted historian, Shelby Foote, wrote, when Union soldiers asked a group of Confederate prisoners why they were fighting, this reply came: "Because you're down here and we are too!" The monument is a memorial to these brave, selfless men and the many others who stood behind them, facing not only death but the incredible devastation that shattered the South's economy. (Agricultural production, as you may know, did not return to prewar levels until the 1930s!) Even at Appomattox, when all was lost, the men fought on, beating off Union attacks, as historian Fletcher Pratt described it, "in sad, heroic rallies."

The memorial is not dedicated to political leaders, or even to the senior officers that led these heroic men. It is dedicated to the dead and to their memories. Virtually every home in the South suffered a loss. Cherished pictures of the dead hung on the walls of thousands of homes for many decades after these soldiers died. If there was any memory of the "Lost Cause" prevalent among these survivors, it was not the "white supremacy" or "Jim Crow" arguments put forth by amateur pseudo-historians like Seidule. Instead, it was, as Emory Thomas has put it, a coming to terms, a realization that good people could fight and lose and die and still remain good people. Ezekiel's monument is a tribute - by the people of the South and indeed, as witnessed by its placement in Arlington and its veneration by many presidents, by the entire nation to these departed souls. Let them rest in peace! End this destructive exercise in "woke" and useless symbolism and preserve the monument.

As a past-president and current member of the Ladies Memorial Association of Petersburg, Virginia, I am utterly appalled to hear of the possible removal of the Confederate Memorial Monument in Arlington National Cemetery.

This monument is a national treasure, designed and constructed by the famous Jewish artist Moses Ezekiel. Ezekiel was also a Virginia Military Institute cadet and fought alongside his fellow citizen soldiers during the Battle of New Market on May 15, 1864.

The Ladies Memorial Association of Petersburg was founded in 1866 in order to give proper Christian burial to the approximate 30,000 confederate soldiers who died during the Siege of Petersburg. Dear Mr. Davis,

I write about public art and architecture for a number of national publications, including City Journal, the Wall Street Journal, the Claremont Review of Books, and The American Conservative. Monuments have been a major topic in my work for 25 years.

I wish to express my strong opposition to the removal of Moses Ezekiel's Confederate monument from Arlington National Cemetery. I am not a "Southern partisan" where the Civil War is concerned. My roots are in Virginia but my views on that terrible conflict have been shaped by the eminent historian James M. McPherson and his magisterial *Battle Cry of Freedom* (Oxford, 1988).

One of the more outrageous aspects of the Naming Commission's recommendation for the Arlington Confederate monument's removal is that it is made at a time when public opinion not just about monuments but about a very wide range of topics of vital concern to the nation's future is split down the middle. Removal of Ezekiel's Confederate monument from Arlington cemetery would be a nakedly partisan act that needlessly fosters deeper divisions in our body politic.

What's more, the idea of transferring the monument to a museum, as descendants of the sculptor have urged, is not realistic, as art historian Samantha Baskind of Cleveland State University recently noted in the *Washington Post*. It is too big and too massive for that. And it deserves a far better fate than banishment to a museological Siberia, not to speak of a far more likely relegation to a warehouse in a permanent state of disassembly. It deserves to remain exactly where it is.

The toxic partisan atmosphere engulfing this country is revealed by the simplistic tagging of Ezekiel's creation as a monument to white supremacy. I strongly question the politically-correct, academically inculcated assumption that the perpetuation of white supremacy underlay the Arlington monument's design. Ezekiel's evocation of the Lost Cause was retrospective and romantic in character. A Confederate veteran

himself, he aspired to exalt what was noblest in the South's struggle for independence. That is what monument makers have been doing from time immemorial. By the same token, Ezekiel's work is a quintessential Lost Cause monument, as the inscription from Lucan's *Pharsalia* clearly indicates: "The victorious cause pleased the gods but the vanquished pleased Cato." What gets drowned out in the deluge of virtue-signaling, however, is the monumental recognition that the "cause" was "lost"—that these United States would be one and indivisible going forward. In other words, the monument should be judged in terms of its historical context, not according to the historically deracinated pieties of the woke. How many thousands of descendants of Confederate warriors, mindful of their forebears' valor, have given their lives in our nation's defense since Appomattox?

Monuments are landmarks, reminding us of where we've been as a political and cultural community. Ezekiel's Confederate monument is a major landmark under both those headings. He was one of the best sculptors this country ever produced. Americans should be free to contemplate his Arlington creation with the educated detachment that ought to be expected of the citizens of a modern republic—and indeed was expected of them until cancel culture's recent irruption. And we should note that as America has become a more just society, previously excluded communities have acquired the power and influence to commemorate their own heroes. That is as it should be. But nothing—absolutely nothing—will be gained by banishing Ezekiel's Confederate monument, a major historic landmark, from Arlington Memorial Cemetery.

As a private citizen of these United States (as in representing myself only) I am appalled of the Naming Commission's recommendation to remove the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery. **Spoiler Alert**: removing the memorial will not do anything to CHANGE a dark blot on our history in which hundreds of thousands of our citizens died.

Good gentlepersons look to the name itself. Clearly the memorial celebrates reconciliation of both North & South after the bloodiest conflict in the nation's history. As deeply divided as these United States are today, I propose we celebrate reconciliation not hide it. After so much death in the conflict there was a level of unity in that both men of the former North and South fought together to preserve our liberty in the "Great War" and WWII. I now propose a single question, will reconciliation of citizens at odds currently be improved by removal of the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery? My thought is it will only deepen the current divide!

In closing I wish to remind you of the story of young Sam Davis. Sam who was captured during the war and hung as a spy, even though he was wearing his uniform when captured. General Dodge told him if he would just identify who his leader was, he could go free. The gentleman General Dodge was inquiring about was only a few cells down from him in the same jail. Therefore, it would have been very easy just to point him out and save his own life! Then, young Sam responded, if he had a thousand lives, he would give them all rather than betray a friend. His family sent a wagon to retrieve his corpse and crossing the Duck River at Columbia Tennessee a Union solider helped in the crossing as the water was high when they found out it was the body of young Sam Davis being returned home. About 30-40 years later there was an effort to erect a monument for Sam Davis. It was a struggle to provide funds as money was tight in the South. At that time there was a recession in the 1890s. Sirs:

The assault on history continues. Using the excuse of "slavery," the current politically correct but factually *incorrect* members of government, the media and the establishment now intend to remove all the monuments, symbols and, eventually we must reason, *the bodies* of those who fought for the Confederacy in the American "civil war." However, this is not an action open to those who intend to pursue it. The matter was addressed and, we must assume, settled at the turn of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. At that time there was a move in the North to reconcile with Southerners.

When the Spanish-American War concluded successfully in December 1898, President McKinley used this as an opportunity to "mend the fences". **On 14 December 1898** the President gave a speech in which he urged reconciliation based on the outstanding service of Southerners during the recent war with Spain. Remember, as part of the conciliation, several former Confederate officers were commissioned as generals to include former Confederate cavalry generals, Joseph Wheeler and Fitzhugh Lee. President McKinley stated:

"...every soldier's grave made during our unfortunate civil war [sic] is a tribute to American valor... And the time has now come... when in the spirit of fraternity, we should share in the care of the graves of the Confederate soldiers...The cordial feeling now happily existing between the North and South prompts this gracious act and if it needed further justification it is found in the gallant loyalty to the Union and the flag so conspicuously shown in the year just passed by the sons and grandsons of those heroic dead."

The response from Congress to this plea was magnanimous and resulted in the Appropriations Act of FY 1901 (below).

Confederate Cemetery:

Congressional Appropriations Act, FY 1901, signed 6 June 1900

Congress passed an act of appropriations for \$2,500 that enabled the "Secretary of War to have reburied in some suitable spot in the national cemetery at Arlington, Virginia, and to place proper headstones at their graves, the bodies of about 128 Confederate soldiers now buried in the National Soldiers Home near Washington, D.C., and the bodies of about 136 Confederate soldiers now buried in the national cemetery at Arlington, Virginia."

Remarks: More important than the amount (worth substantially more in 1900 than in 2000) is the move to support reconciliation by Congressional act. In 1906, Confederate Battle flags were ordered to be returned to the states from whence they originated. Some states refused to return the flags. Wisconsin still has at least one flag it refuses to return.

Congressional Act of 9 March 1906

We Honor Our Fallen Ancestors:

(P.L. 38, 59th Congress, Chap. 631-34 Stat. 56)

This Act authorized the furnishing of headstones for the graves of Confederates who died, primarily in Union prison camps and were buried in Federal cemeteries.

Remarks: This act formally reaffirmed Confederate soldiers as military combatants with legal standing. It granted recognition to deceased Confederate soldiers commensurate with the status of deceased Union soldiers.

[An Additional Editor's Note from the site from which this information was taken: I might also add here that the opening ceremonies off every Sons of Confederate Veterans Reunion always include a welcoming address by the commander of the Grand Army of the Republic descendent organization...Jim Dean]

U.S. Public Law 810, Approved by 17th Congress 26 February 1929

(45 Stat 1307 – Currently on the books as 38 U.S. Code, Sec. 2306)

This law, passed by the U.S. Congress, authorized the "Secretary of War to erect headstones over the graves of soldiers who served in the Confederate Army and to direct him to preserve in the records of the War Department the names and places of burial of all soldiers for whom such headstones shall have been erected."

Remarks: This act broadened the scope of recognition further for all Confederate soldiers to receive burial benefits equivalent to Union soldiers. It authorized the use of U.S. government (public) funds to mark Confederate graves and record their locations.

U.S. Public Law 85-425: Sec. 410 Approved 23 May 1958

Confederate Iron Cross

(US Statutes at Large Volume 72, Part 1, Page 133-134)

The Administrator shall pay to each person who served in the military or naval forces of the Confederate States of America during the Civil War a monthly pension in the same amounts and subject to the same conditions as would have been applicable to such person under the laws in effect on December 31, 1957, if his service in such forces had been service in the military or naval forces of the United States.

Conclusion:

If the United States Government is simply going to ignore laws and acts that appear in its own records and on its own books in order to placate the WOKE and the ignorant, where does that end? 

Dear Commissioners,

I am writing as a U.S. military veteran, a former graduate history professor, and a proud Southerner to request that our memorial, "New South" *not* be removed from Arlington National Cemetery. I proudly wore the Army uniform for 29 years having enlisted during the Vietnam War. I'm not so sure I can be as proud of our Army now due to the concerted actions to denigrate my ancestors who were *American soldiers* in the Confederate Army.

For the 25 years, since I taught the core curriculum and electives on the Civil War at the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, I have continued to take military units to battlefields to study. This current move to demonize Confederates is astonishing to say the least. This move is completely undoing the goodwill reconciliation begun by a former Union Army officer veteran, President William McKinley. His call for reconciliation was intended to heal the wounds of war and thank the South for supporting the country during the Spanish-American War. He stated:

"...every soldier's grave made during our unfortunate civil war [sic] is a tribute to **American valor** [my emphasis]... And the time has now come... when in the spirit of fraternity we should share in the care of the graves of the Confederate soldiers...The cordial feeling now happily existing between the North and South prompts this gracious act and if it needed further justification it is found in the gallant loyalty to the Union and the flag so conspicuously shown in the year just passed by the sons and grandsons of those heroic dead."

This led to four acts of Congress granting *American* (not U.S.) veterans' status to Confederate Americans. The furnishing of government soldier headstones to Confederates was the outcome of the congressional acts beginning in 1901. The men who fought the Confederates largely supported McKinley's reconciliation policy and now, over 100 years later, the ugly scabs left from that conflict are being ripped-off again for no legitimate reasons other than revenge by a few. Millions of our tax dollars are being expended for what good reason? To erase our military history? The hundreds of foreign officers that I taught over the years had a better knowledge of our Civil War than the majority of our American officers. They believed that this effort of "cancel culture" is just plain stupid. I agree.

The cancel culture mentality born of BLM riots is nothing less than Marxist "*Eracism*". Canceling, erasing, changing or denying factual history is a Marxist tactic. As an example, I have been giving presentations on black Confederate soldiers for over 25 years. Deniers make all sorts of excuses to say they didn't exist but the designer of "New South" served with them and put them on the monument in 1914! This isn't "new" history. Yes, Jewish-Confederate

Ezekiel Moses knew they served because he went to war with them. Falling prey to "presentism", the deniers use modern standards to try and rationalize how blacks could not have fought with the Confederate Army. I could write pages on this topic but I suggest starting with a black friend's relatively recent book, "*An Orderly For Lee*". Al Arnold was a non-believer until he saw photographic evidence leading him to do extensive research on his ancestor. There are many others and black author / artist, Gregory Newson just published his extensive rosters of black Confederates, a number who received Confederate pensions. Some resided in Confederate Old Soldier Homes. Lest the readers of this letter discount them as totally "forced" labor, let me remind them that I served in an Army of draftees...those "forced to serve" as well. Many of their names are on the Vietnam memorial just like those of us who volunteered. It is important to remember that applying today's standards of enlistment and service was not the same 150 years ago. The fact is many blacks voluntarily served. The definitions of "soldier" do not include having to be formally enlisted. The blacks who supported the Confederacy were not directly supporting slavery but defending their homes and way of life as Dr. McPherson has so aptly stated. They belong on the "New South" memorial in Arlington having served honorably!

The illogical excuse of calling Confederates "traitors" as a rationale to remove their memory is not based on substantiated facts but rather on emotional slander. I ask the commission for the name of just one Confederate tried for "treason". I would be interested in knowing just one name of a Confederate convicted of "treason". I will assist those who are not historians tally the score. The score for both questions is "0". Supreme Court Chief Justice Salmon Chase warned President Johnson to NOT try Confederates for "treason". The reason: it might prove that secession was actually legal. Calling Confederates names does not make them so. We are tired of the smears that have lost their true meanings but have become the weapons of the radicals on the left. It is part-and-parcel of Marxists tactics employed by BLM and others on the left. It should be recognized as such.

Finally, the witch hunt to erase any vestige of racism in our history by attacking Confederates is rife with HYPOCRISY. The U.S. Army finally allowed blacks to serve in the Union Army in 1863. The assault on history continues. Using the excuse of "slavery," the current politically correct but factually *incorrect* members of government, the media and the establishment now intend to remove all the monuments, symbols and, eventually we must reason, *the bodies* of those who fought for the Confederacy in the American "civil war." *However, this is not an action open to those who intend to pursue it.* The matter was addressed and, we must assume, settled at the turn of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. At that time there was a move in the North to reconcile with Southerners.

When the Spanish-American War concluded successfully in December 1898, President McKinley used this as an opportunity to "mend the fences". **On 14 December 1898** the President gave a speech in which he urged reconciliation based on the outstanding service of Southerners during the recent war with Spain. Remember, as part of the conciliation, several former Confederate officers were commissioned as generals to include former Confederate cavalry generals, Joseph Wheeler and Fitzhugh Lee. President McKinley stated:

"...every soldier's grave made during our unfortunate civil war [sic] is a tribute to American valor... And the time has now come... when in the spirit of fraternity, we should share in the care of the graves of the Confederate soldiers...The cordial feeling now happily existing between the North and South prompts this gracious act and if it needed further justification it is found in the gallant loyalty to the Union and the flag so conspicuously shown in the year just passed by the sons and grandsons of those heroic dead."

The response from Congress to this plea was magnanimous and resulted in the Appropriations Act of FY 1901 (below).

Confederate Cemetery:

Congressional Appropriations Act, FY 1901, signed 6 June 1900

Congress passed an act of appropriations for \$2,500 that enabled the "Secretary of War to have reburied in some suitable spot in the national cemetery at Arlington, Virginia, and to place proper headstones at their graves, the bodies of about 128 Confederate soldiers now buried in the National Soldiers Home near Washington, D.C., and the bodies of about 136 Confederate soldiers now buried in the national cemetery at Arlington, Virginia."

Remarks: More important than the amount (worth substantially more in 1900 than in 2000) is the move to support reconciliation by Congressional act. In 1906, Confederate Battle flags were ordered to be returned to the states from whence they originated. Some states refused to return the flags. Wisconsin still has at least one flag it refuses to return.

Congressional Act of 9 March 1906

We Honor Our Fallen Ancestors:

(P.L. 38, 59th Congress, Chap. 631-34 Stat. 56)

This Act authorized the furnishing of headstones for the graves of Confederates who died, primarily in Union prison camps and were buried in Federal cemeteries.

Remarks: This act formally reaffirmed Confederate soldiers as military combatants with legal standing. It granted recognition to deceased Confederate soldiers commensurate with the status of deceased Union soldiers.

[An Additional Editor's Note from the site from which this information was taken: I might also add here that the opening ceremonies off every Sons of Confederate Veterans Reunion always include a welcoming address by the commander of the Grand Army of the Republic descendent organization...Jim Dean]

U.S. Public Law 810, Approved by 17th Congress 26 February 1929

(45 Stat 1307 – Currently on the books as 38 U.S. Code, Sec. 2306)

This law, passed by the U.S. Congress, authorized the "Secretary of War to erect headstones over the graves of soldiers who served in the Confederate Army and to direct him to preserve in the records of the War Department the names and places of burial of all soldiers for whom such headstones shall have been erected."

Remarks: This act broadened the scope of recognition further for all Confederate soldiers to receive burial benefits equivalent to Union soldiers. It authorized the use of U.S. government (public) funds to mark Confederate graves and record their locations.

U.S. Public Law 85-425: Sec. 410 Approved 23 May 1958

Confederate Iron Cross

(US Statutes at Large Volume 72, Part 1, Page 133-134)

The Administrator shall pay to each person who served in the military or naval forces of the Confederate States of America during the Civil War a monthly pension in the same amounts and subject to the same conditions as would have been applicable to such person under the laws in effect on December 31, 1957, if his service in such forces had been service in the military or naval forces of the United States.

Conclusion:

If the United States Government is simply going to ignore laws and acts that appear in its own records and on its own books in order to placate the WOKE and the ignorant, where does that end? He was born about 1 June 1832 or 1833 in Johnston County North Carolina and "died of a disability" at Camp Mount Pisgah on the southern slope of Clarks Mountain, east of Orange, Virginia. He left behind a wife of 8 years, and 5 children, 3 of which were sons and 2 daughters. The 1860 census listed the value of his personal property at \$25. He owned no land or slaves. He enlisted on June 1, 1861 after North Carolina seceded on May 20th when President Lincoln issued the call for 75,000 volunteers to put down the rebellion. He died on April 2, 1862. I believe to this day that he served honorably and enlisted to defend his home and state, not slavery.

My two uncles served in World War II, my uncle Russell Lee Davis as an infantryman in the 3rd Division in the later years of the war, '43-45 and my uncle Carey Mayo Davis in the Eighth Army Air Corps in England maintaining planes. My father, who was younger, served in the Army from 1956-1958 in the 354th Field Artillery out of Fort Sill, Oklahoma and Bad Kissingen, West Germany. My grandfather, Roy Lee Phillips served in the US Navy on board the Frank Knox DDS 742 and was present in Tokyo Bay and the signing of the surrender to end World War II. These American soldiers were descendants of Confederate soldiers. They served the United States of America by serving in the Armed Forces. 
This is the largest monument in Arlington Cemetery. Sculptured by Moses Jacob Ezekiel, a former Confederate Army Sergeant, who was Jewish.

I am writing in response to a proposal to remove or alter the Confederate memorial at Arlington National Cemetery.

This proposed action does not make any sense. This was erected to memorialize war dead, and was put there in the spirit of national reconciliation following the War Between the States. It was not put up to celebrate the "Lost Cause" – it was a token of piece that was celebrated by north and south alike, and by survivors of both the Union and Confederate armies.

The post-war period from 1865 until the late 1930's was a unique time in American history. Most citizens wanted to reunite and heal the wounds left by the War, and there was a great deal of give and take. Unfortunately, Black and Native Americans did not benefit from much of the healing that took place.

However, two wrongs do not make a right. Destroying works of public and memorial art in the name of righting past wrongs is foolish and counterproductive. The fact of the matter is, if you remove these things from public sight, they eventually disappear from the public memory, and mistakes will be forgotten and repeated instead of learned from.

The argument a few years ago was that Confederate memorials belonged in graveyards, museums and battlefields – witness now what is being suggested with this monument. It is proposed that it be removed from a cemetery. And I understand that there was a recent bill before Congress to remove Confederate markers and memorials from Gettysburg National Battlefield Park.

One of the many problems with the official approval and execution of such proposals is that vandalism by individuals and groups is encouraged, and even more is demanded by those claiming to be "offended." Witness the removal of President Theodore Roosevelt's statue from the Museum of Natural History in NYC, the removal of singer Miss Kate Smith's statue in Philadelphia, the removal of Chief Justice Roger Taney's statue in Baltimore, the removal of composer and songwriter Stephen Collins Foster's statue in Pittsburgh.

Even the dead cannot be at peace – in Atlanta's Oakland Cemetery the "Lion of Atlanta" – a sculpture that marked a mass grave of unknown Confederate dead, was badly vandalized and eventually removed from the Cemetery.

In Asheville, NC the Vance Memorial obelisk in Pack Square was removed because the man who it honored, Zebulon Vance, was born into a slave-owning family, served in the Confederate Army and as Confederate Governor of NC, and held fairly standard 19th century views on race. Never mind that he was also a post-war governor of NC and a US Senator who used his influence for the general good of his home county. And also never mind that the obelisk was not a statue of the man himself, but a plain granite obelisk – that was commissioned and paid for by Mr. George Willis Pack, a northerner who moved to Asheville for his health in the 1880's and befriended then Senator Vance thru the Masonic Lodge. Pack commissioned Richard Sharp Smith, supervising architect of the Biltmore Estate, to design and execute the monument in honor of Vance after his death in 1894. What makes it especially interesting is that Pack was an abolitionist, he served as one of Abraham Lincoln's electors from the State of Michigan in 1860, and he helped pay for the construction of the Beaumont School – the first school for black children in Asheville – and he paid the teachers salaries for a number of years.

My point is that many of these monuments were not erected to keep minorities "in their place." Most were erected to commemorate the men and boys who had fallen in the War. They are no different than the thousands of Union monuments dotting northern landscapes – the same firms made and sold "Billy Yank" and "Johnny Reb" versions of the same statues in granite, marble and bronze. The difference was that the south was largely impoverished by the War, and it took decades for them to be able to fund memorial statuary.

For your awareness, I served in the US Army for almost 30 years – as a retired officer I still know my duty and my Oath to the United States Constitution, despite the fact that I am a North Carolinian born and bred. However, if I were posed with what U.S. citizens faced in 1861, I have no idea what I would have done – neither do you. Neither does anyone else who is alive today.

Please consider allowing the Arlington Reconciliation Monument to stand unaltered – plaques could be added to provide historical context. The Confederate and Union guns have been silent for over 150 years. Please let the dead sleep on.

I was sorry to hear the speech of the young gentleman from Marshall county. I am sorry that any son of a soldier should go on record as opposed to the erection of a monument in honor of the brave dead. And, sir, I am convinced that had he seen what I saw at Seven Pines and in the seven day's fighting round Richmond, the battlefields covered with the mangled forms of those who fought for their country and their country's honor, he would not have made that speech. When the news came that the South was to be invaded, those men went forth to fight for what they believed, and they made no requests for monuments to commemorate their brave deeds and holy sacrifices. But they died, and their virtues should be remembered. Sir, I went with them. I, too, wore the gray, the same color that my master wore. We staid four long years, and if that sad war had gone on till now I would have been there yet. I know what it all meant, and understand the meaning of my words, when I say that I would have been with my countrymen still had the war continued until this good day. I want to honor those brave men who died for their convictions. When my mother died I was a boy. Who, sir, then acted the part of a mother to the orphaned slave boy but my 'old missis?' I want it known to all the world that my vote is given in favor of the bill to erect a monument in honor of the brave Confederate dead." 

I oppose the Naming Commission's recommendation to remove the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery.

The Moses Ezekiel Confederate monument in Arlington National Cemetery was erected in June of 1914, a time when the nation was still seeking reconciliation from the wrenching wounds of the Civil War that saw the deaths of more Americans than all our other wars combined. President Wilson was asked to give the acceptance speech at Arlington that day.

A year earlier, over 50,000 old veterans of the war came together at Gettysburg in a massive show of reconciliation and unity. That reunion was also marked with a Presidential speech. Just a few years later, with WWI breaking out in Europe, new military bases were established in the South and named for prominent Confederate Generals. Southerners then and later in WW II flocked to recruiting centers in support of what their grandfathers had referred to as "the old flag."

Today that's all changed. Now too many public officials foster division and disunity. Most of these people never so much as stood in the chow line much less heard a shot fired in anger. We see today's military branches falling far short of their recruiting goals and yet leaders continue to push concepts and actions that divide the nation. Do they not know that 44% of recruits between the ages of 17 and 24 come from the South, which is only 36% of the population? At the same time, only 23% nationally of that age demographic can qualify for service in our all-volunteer military and of that group, a very few are even inclined to serve. This is not the recipe for what Ronald Reagan referred to as "peace through strength."

My forbearers fought in the Civil War on the Southern side, and their grandfathers fought in the Revolution. In World War II, it was my dad's turn. During the Vietnam War in 1967, I took sabbatical leave from law school to volunteer. I wound up doing two tours back-to-back, finishing law school at night afterwards, and continuing military service through Desert Storm for a total of 25 years.

It has been the mark of manhood and civility and longstanding American tradition to leave politics out of the way we honor our veterans. They fought the battles, they shed the blood, they reconciled with their enemies. End of subject. It is not for those born more than a hundred and fifty years later to re-adjudicate the past and expose to double jeopardy men their own contemporaries exonerated.

For God's sake let the young veterans buried around the Ezekiel monument rest in peace and keep their memorial. Removing monuments to America's veterans is an abomination.

Since it was erected, scores of Southern men have given their lives for the American Flag, as this monument helped bring our Country back together.


I am appalled that unknowledgeable people blame the South for Slavery and incorrectly believe that was what the war was about. Slavery was an American problem, just predominant in the South.

Dear Arlington Cemetery Committee:

I am writing to you to express my opposition to the destruction of the "New South" Monument (aka "Confederate Memorial") at Arlington National Cemetery per the recommendation of The Naming Commission, which derived its authority from section 370 of the 2021 National Defense Authorization Act. Please note that I am a private citizen and not affiliated with any political action committee, heritage group or veterans' association. Despite not having any ancestors that fought in the Civil War, I am a lover of history and greatly enjoy visiting historical sites.

My opposition to the monument's destruction is for four primary reasons:

- 1. The recommendation is outside of the remit of The Naming Commission. Section 370 limits its recommendations to assets that "honor the CSA" or to individuals that "voluntarily served in the CSA"—this memorial does neither
- 2. The Naming Commission report offers its own interpretation of the statues that is not based in its actual history
- 3. Any disrespect to one group of American veterans is disrespect to all American veterans
- 4. The Department of Defense has no right to destroy property owned by the American people

Reason #1: The Recommendation is Outside The Naming Commission's Remit

Section 370 of the 2021 NDAA authorizes the Secretary of Defense to "remove all names, symbols, displays, monuments, and paraphernalia that honor or commemorate the Confederate States of America (commonly referred to as the "Confederacy") or any person who served voluntarily with the Confederate States of America from all assets of the Department of Defense."

As this asset is not to a person, the question is if "The New South" is to "honor or commemorate the Confederate States of America." There is no question that the monument does no such thing: it honors the soldiers that fought and died in the Civil War. The monument was approved by the Ohio Republican William Howard Taft & he said to the sculptor that he "contributed to the peaceful solution of our affairs." Moreover, a Union veteran spoke at the monument's dedication—why would he or anyone else support a monument that honors a foreign nation that he never felt existed? The statue itself declares it purpose with the inscription not mentioned in the report: "An Obedience To Duty As They Understood it; These Men Suffered All; Sacrificed All and Died!" The key phrase is "as they understood it," which is representative of every soldier in every American war. A move towards destruction of this monument opens every monument at Arlington to destruction when a new generation questions past decisions of their government. In fact, this is already occurring with wars such as with Mexico, Vietnam & Iraq. Arlington National Cemetery should know better than anyone that monuments are to the soldiers and their sacrifice, not necessarily the political issues that bring about wars.

It appears The Naming Commission merely copied language directly from Arlington's website in relation to the quote about "the lost cause." The entire monument, taken together as one piece, demonstrates that it is one towards peace and reunion. Here is how Joseph Gutman and Stanley F. Chyet explain the monument in the preface to Ezekiel's memoirs:

"On top of the monument a heroic-sized allegorical figure typifies the South. She holds in her extended right hand a laurel wreath with which to crown the dead; her left hand rests on a plowshare, and her head is crowned by olive leaves, symbolic of peace. The plinth upon which she stands is adorned with four

cinerary urns, one for each war year. Below the plinth is a frieze of fourteen shields with the coat of arms of the states of the Confederacy. The inscription below the figure South is from Isaiah 2:4: "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks"

It is easy to see why Ezekiel called the monument "The New South." It is a representation of the sacrifice and lives lost that led to a new future for the region.

There is no mention of the CSA as a nation or the new CSA government in any of the dedication speeches. Therefore, it does not fall into the remit of the Naming Commission. It does not honor or commemorate the CSA and under the current law the Secretary of Defense cannot take any action to remove or destroy the statue.

Reason #2: The Naming Commission Substitutes Its Own Interpretation for History

Virtually every article I have seen in the press regarding the memorial mentions a connection to slavery. The Naming Commission made this the center of the conversation even though it is irrelevant to the law and its mandate. Why they chose to ignore their duty is a matter of speculation but now I must inform the committee of the historical facts: slavery is not honored in this statue.

Gutman and Chyet point out that Ezekiel's work symbolized realism, and quoted the sculptor at length:

"As was his custom with his monuments, Ezekiel proceeded meticulously to reflect historic accuracy. His chisel wrote in bronze a literal, detailed history of "The New South" — symbolic of peace for a reunited living people and of honor for the Southern dead. "It is necessary," he remarked, "to gather up and buy, or have made, or loaned, every real article I would need in the way of dress and trappings and details of all kinds, such as I would need in the modeling of a work of this nature."

The fact is that slavery was the main labor system of the South at the time of the war and some soldiers owned slaves. To be clear, the statue is not marked, so it is only an interpretation that the Black woman shown is a slave. We can also say, that as a factual matter, none of the dedication speeches mentioned anything that would honor slavery or honor the Confederate States of America. When did this slavery interpretation become dominant? If not by the people who fought the war, paid for the statue, designed the statue, or honored the statue, then when? Because The Naming Commission doesn't cite its sources, we cannot even know their view—which is why it appears to be their own interpretation.

Only one speech at the monument's dedication, by Robert E. Lee's grandson, mentioned slavery, and he called it a "dark veil." Therefore, nobody on the committee should feel that preserving this monument is a defense of slavery.

Reason 3: Disrespect to some American Soldiers is Disrespect to All

Congress, it its moment of wisdom, was careful not to harm the reputation of any American veterans, stating in section 370 of the 2021 NDAA that only assets that "honor" the CSA or honor individuals that served "voluntarily" in the CSA would be impacted. Therefore, there should not be much controversy in any recommendations made by The Naming Commission. Instead of listening to my opinion, I think you should hear from someone who can no longer speak: a Union veteran. General Washington Gardner, the Commander-in-Chief of the GAR spoke at the dedication of the Confederate monument in Arlington National Cemetery. He said:

"It seems fitting that here in this place and on these grounds, once the home of Robert E. Lee, there should rest the remains of some of the gallant men who followed that great soldier even unto death. It is fitting here, in sight of the Nation's Capital, and in this vast burial plot consecrated to American valor that some of our fellow-countrymen, the representatives of once hostile armies whose unsurpassed bravery is now a common heritage and pride, should rest in undisturbed slumber, and that the place of final sepulture should be under the supervision and care of the National Government.....This memorial structure speaks the language of peace and good-will. It says to all who come hither and read the superscription that the swords and bayonets that once gleamed along the battle's fiery front have been 'beaten into plowshares and pruning hooks.' It declares through the symbolical wreath of unfading laurel held in outstretched hand above the sleeping dead that the spirit of heroic devotion and lofty self-sacrifice which they manifested is held in grateful and affectionate memory."

Why would the leader of the largest Union veteran's organization honor the CSA? He wouldn't and he didn't. His words expressed the meaning of the memorial and what it meant to "American valor." These facts were not in The Naming Commission's report and the Department of Defense never reviewed this information. Not only is action against the statue illegal, but it is also an insult to every American that fought in the Civil War and American citizens today that believe in sacrifice.

Reason 4: Destroying Property of the American People is Unacceptable

The Naming Commission is not recommending that the monument is removed or put in a museum, rather it is recommending that the statue is destroyed. Congress gave The Naming Commission the ability to define a grave marker. This memorial would disturb graves if removed. Not only did The Naming Commission go beyond its remit but it had special powers in case it encountered a situation like this where a monument could not be safely removed. We can only speculate to the motives of The Naming Commission but once again the optics are not positive.

If the Department of Defense cannot hold onto this monument for another day, then I will be happy to purchase it today. Then everyone can be happy! Unfortunately, the recommendation is designed to create disunion, which is exactly the opposite of the message of the monument. The goal was not to offend a Yankee like me, but it has. And why am I offended? Because this is my property. I pay my taxes. I have no criminal record. I treat those with different political & religious beliefs with respect. If the Department of Defense believes that political appointees can destroy property that is partially owned by me, then they are mistaken. Americans donated thousands of dollars to design this statue and the sculptor, who is buried at its base, could not make a profit. We appreciate their sacrifices just as we do all American soldiers, in the North & the South. They had seen and felt for themselves what happens when a nation turns on itself, and they were determined not to let it happen again.

It took 14 years for private groups (including Union veteran organizations) to raise the money and erect the Confederate memorial that stands in Arlington today. Anyone who has seen it knows that it reflects the sentiments of reconciliation and national unity that President McKinley, who fought for the Union, originally had in mind.

The memorial's central figure is a woman, meant to represent the South, crowned with an olive wreath, a symbol of peace. In her extended left hand is a laurel wreath and in her right hand is a pruning hook, which rests upon a plow. Under the figure is an inscription, a quote from the Book of Isaiah, "And they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks."

That is to say, the monument's central theme is reconciliation and peace — beating swords into ploughshares. It commends the South for turning away from war while also honoring their war dead.



I am submitting this statement because I oppose the Naming Commission's recommendation to remove the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery. Have we forgotten the work of Civil War veterans, North and South, who sought to bind up wounds, to remember the good and forgive the bad? They attended each other's veteran reunions. They worked to establish the National Military Park system so that the history would not be forgotten.



The very ground upon which this Reconciliation Memorial sits was given to Robert E. Lee's wife, Mary Anna, by George Washington Parke Custis, grandson of Martha Washington. It was stolen from the Lee family during The War of Northern Aggression and has since become Arlington National Cemetery, where dead soldiers are honored - unless they happen to be Confederate.

The war was a war of secession and the right to self-govern. Secession was not, and is not, illegal, and this was taught at West Point long before the war commenced. In 1776, the Declaration of Independence established that the new republic derived its "just powers from the consent of the governed." That is what the South wanted. The right to self-govern. Horace Greeley stated the following about secession, "if it justified the secession from the British Empire of Three Millions of colonists in 1776, we do not see why it would not justify the secession of Five Millions of Southrons from the Federal Union in 1861." Of course, Greeley did change his position once he realized the pending economic doom of the North with the South's secession due to its dependence on cotton and tariffs.

My family settled in New Kent County, Virginia, in 1656. More than 100 of my extended family served as Confederate soldiers during the War Between the States; and many of them died in the war -- including my own great-grandfather who died in February 1863.

From a state population of 640,000 Virginia fielded about 150,000 patriotic soldiers in Confederate service. Of these, 32,751 died in Confederate service. Survivors of that war and their families vowed that Virginia would never forget the bravery and sacrifice of the soldiers in defending their country; and they created permanent memorials -- including street names -- to honor them. Compare that 32,751-life-sacrifice with the 11,444 Virginians who were killed in all of World War 2 -- and that was from a 1940s population of 2,677,000. The Confederate war losses for Virginia were crushing.

Eventually, the United States -- again united -- enacted a law establishing Confederate soldiers as United States veterans on <u>equal footing</u> with other U.S. military veterans -- entitled to the same status, honors and benefits. [Title 38 Section 1501, U.S. Code]

In the years after the war, four former Confederate generals were later appointed as generals in the U.S. Army. (MG Matthew Butler, MG Fitzhugh Lee, BG Thomas Rosser, MG Joseph Wheeler) when the U.S. engaged in the Spanish-American War. After the War Between the States President Ulysses Grant arranged for employment in California for CSA guerilla leader Col. John Singleton Mosby; and Mosby later was appointed as U.S. Consul to Hong Kong, and subsequently as Assistant U.S. Attorney General. After the War Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee became president of Washington College (now Washington and Lee University) in 1865 until his death in 1870. Eight Confederate soldiers have been honored on U.S. postage stamps; and three on U.S. Mint silver commemorative half-dollars: (Gen. Robert E. Lee [1937], common CSA soldier [1936], Gen. Robert E. Lee & Gen. Thomas [Stonewall] Jackson [1925]).

Thousands of Confederate soldiers are buried in U.S. National Cemeteries – including my G-G-Grandfather (25th Texas Cavalry). There are 33 Confederate war memorials in U.S. National Cemeteries.

You are considering removing (<u>desecrating</u>) the Confederate Memorial which is located at the center of the Confederate-graves section of Arlington National Cemetery – our Nation's most Sacred military shrine.^[1] (Using land illegally confiscated by the U.S.

Government from Gen. Robert E. Lee and his wife Mary Anna Custis Lee). It is a beautiful memorial, and it depicts soldiers departing their families and marching off to defend their nation – including a Black Confederate soldier. (Yes, there were some Black Confederate soldiers.)

The inscription reads:

"Not for fame or reward –
Not for place or for rank –
Not lured by ambition –
Or goaded by necessity –
But in simple –
Obedience to duty –
As they understood it –
These men suffered all –
Sacrificed all –
Dared all – And Died"

If you decide to abolish memorials and honors to our Confederate soldiers/veterans, because you have a political disagreement with the administration under which they served, you attack me and every other American veteran. Who's next? Will you or your successors then deface memorials which honor American veterans of World War 1 because they fought to defend a country which had racial segregation and which prohibited women from voting? Perhaps you would like to deface memorials to World War 2 American veterans because America had racial segregation, a segregated Army and put Japanese-Americans in concentration camps. (Perhaps that would also justify tearing down the U.S. Marine Corps Memorial in Arlington?) How about the Iraq War veterans -- a war which Democrats claim was built upon a Republican lie. And, the top of your list would be to dishonor all of our Vietnam War veterans because your party took the view that it was an unjust war. I well-remember Democrats spitting on our veterans as they returned home from the Vietnam battlefields.

I am submitting this statement because I oppose the Naming Commission's recommendation to remove the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery.

In the postwar years, the North and South placed monuments to the community losses. My research has documented, and as I expand the study, it continues to confirm the relationship between community memory and community losses.

Furthermore, these are works where the contemporaries reconciled between former enemies leaving the monuments as bookmarks to history, reminding us to look up the remaining story. The Reconciliation Memorial at Arlington was created by Moses Jacob Ezekiel, a Jewish artist who served under General Thomas "Stonewall Jackson." As a contemporary, Ezekiel would depict what he knew and saw at the time into his artwork. It is not an interpretation of a "Lost Cause" theme some modern viewers cite. Even Horace Greeley commented in The American Conflict: A History of the Great Rebelling in the United States of America 1860- '64 that Edward A. Pollard, the writer of the Lost Cause, work a credible historical account. Monuments created by those in the North and South would be the experts of their time. The modern interpretation of offense is only in the eye of a modern viewer. However, views change over time. The monument should remain a bookmark to history, the time machine from the past to us and the future beyond us. Even the Arlington National Cemetery page on the monument cites, "The Confederate Memorial offers an opportunity for visitors to reflect on the history and meanings of the Civil War, slavery, and the relationship between military service, citizenship, and race in America." The Memorial should remain to tell its story in its own words without modern interpretation to disturb the visitor.

I oppose the removal of the Memorial for several reasons. Primarily, I work in historic preservation, and this is a significant cultural resource listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Removal of such is an adverse effect. Under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, considerations must be made to avoid the adverse effect removing would create. The most straightforward approach to resolve the issue and protect the monument's integrity and setting. By doing this, there would be no need to minimize or mitigate adverse effects.

I am the great-grandson of Pvt. William Britton Embry of the 37th Mississippi Volunteers, CSA, captured at Gettysburg by Union forces and incarcerated at Fort Delaware POW camp until his death about 10 months later from an unhealthy environment, always damp, prevalent disease, poor medical care and substandard food. Several of the guards died because of the unhealthy conditions as well as almost one-third of the prisoners. Historians have revealed it was the deliberate policy of the federal government to provide this level of care to Confederate POW's. I consider this to have been a war crime with the three most responsible officials being the general in charge of the POW camp system, his immediate superior, Secretary of War Edwin Stanton and his immediate superior, the presiding official of the rump government then operating in Washington, D.C., Abraham Lincoln.

Erection of the Reconciliation Monument in Arlington Cemetery was the least the Washington government could have done to make amends for the depredations committed by Union forces during Mr. Lincoln's War Against the States on helpless Southern civilian populations. Reparations should have been paid to those people after the war for their losses. Instead, they were put under military occupation for a time and treated like dirt. A fourth notorious war criminal was General William T. To even suggest the removal of this monument, desecrating the graves of these brave men, is not only reprehensible, it is disgusting in the utmost. Shame on you!		



I have been told that you are the man to contact with regards to expressing concern over the status of the Arlington Confederate Memorial, so I do hope this mail is reaching the correct inbox. If not, I apologize.

I am deeply concerned over the current rhetoric and the recommendations of the so-called "Naming Commission" regarding the aforementioned Memorial. I am submitting this statement because I oppose the Naming Commission's recommendation to remove the Reconciliation Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery.

I oppose the removal of the Memorial because it honors Americans who fought against an unconstitutional invasion from the north. The memorial to these men was first conceived of by President William McKinley, a decorated Union veteran who saw combat at Antietam and in the Shenandoah Valley. During his presidential campaign in 1896, he witnessed untended Confederate graves in the South, and it disturbed him. At the time, the federal government prohibited the decoration of Confederate graves at Arlington, as it had since the end of the "Civil War".

McKinley thought it was time for that to change. At a peace jubilee in December 1898 celebrating the end of the Spanish-American War (the first time since before the Civil War that Americans from both North and South were engaged in a military conflict with a foreign power), McKinley announced that the government would henceforth tend to the graves of Confederate dead buried in federal cemeteries, saying they represented a "tribute to American valor."

The speech prompted calls to disinter Confederate remains at Arlington, which were dispersed throughout the cemetery and mingled with Union graves, and rebury them in a specially designated Confederate section. Congress drafted legislation and provided funding, and McKinley signed the bill in June 1900.

The legislation didn't mention a memorial, but the plans for the Confederate section laid out graves in a circular pattern around a cruciform set of walkways with a central grassy area that the Army Corps of Engineers marked on the plans with an "M," for memorial.

It would take another 14 years for private groups (including Union veteran organizations) to raise the money and erect the Confederate memorial that stands in Arlington today. Anyone who has seen it knows that it reflects the sentiments of reconciliation and national unity that McKinley originally had in mind.

The memorial's central figure is a woman, meant to represent the South, crowned with an olive wreath, a symbol of peace. In her extended left hand is a laurel wreath and in her right hand is a pruning hook, which rests upon a plow. Under the figure is an inscription, a quote from the Book of Isaiah, "And they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks."

That is to say, the memorial's central theme is reconciliation and peace — beating swords into ploughshares. It commends the South for turning away from war while also honoring their war dead.

Critics will note how the Latin inscription on the monument's base contains a reference to the "lost cause," as if that somehow vitiates the overarching purpose and theme of the work. It does not. Authentic reconciliation, after all, involves some degree of compromise, and at the time — within a living generation of Civil War combat — it was enough for North and South to declare together that sectionalism was finished and that the country would bind up its wounds and be united again.

There is only one reason to remove the monument now, in 2022, and it has nothing to do with past or racial reconciliation and everything to do with wielding political power in the present.

I am offended and outraged by this recommendation and ask the Cemetery Commission to reject it.





I enlisted in the US Army in 1973 and was one of the first to join the all-volunteer Army as a Private. Thirty-four years later, I retired from Regular Army as a Major in the Adjutant General's Corps. My father was drafted in the US Army during the Korean War; he was the first to serve in an American army since my great, great, grandfather served in the Confederate States Army. During my career, I served multiple tours of duty in the Military District of Washington, including serving in the 3rd US Infantry Regiment (The Old Guard) at Fort Myer, and on the Army General Staff in the Pentagon. While stationed on Fort Myer, I frequently passed the Reconciliation Memorial and little could I imagine that one day, political correctness would destroy history because it doesn't fit with the image of ignorant people.

When I entered the Army, my black drill sergeants told us: "There is only one color in the US Army, and it is green!" This commission is taking a color blind Army and attempting to divide it by race. It is appalling that an issue is being created that essentially did not exist and I am outraged by it. My direct ancestor was wounded in action, shot in the face while defending Petersburg; not quite a year later he was captured at Five Forks just before Appomattox, and released in July 1865 after signing an oath of allegiance pledging never again to take arms against the United States.

I had a total of six great grandfathers who served in the Confederate States Army and none personally owned slaves. They were good and decent men who answered the call from Virginia, as did others. To degrade that honorable service is despicable. Furthermore, attempts to remove all vestiges of Confederate service as if they did not exist is wrong in every historical way. I have to wonder if you intend to dig up the Confederate dead of Arlington and National Cemeteries elsewhere.

You learn nothing by erasing the past. In fact, you are hurting the retention of currently serving military service members of Southern heritage, and encouraging by your actions from enlisting quality individuals America has depended upon to protect her since 1865. If you want to know why the military has failed to meet its recruiting and retention quotas today, you only have to look at the hate you have projected on the descendents of Southern men who over 160 years ago rejoined America as full citizens of the United States and declared American Veterans by declaration of Congress.

Dear Sir:

I have, over the years, and especially in the past two or three years, seen an appalling advance of barbarism in the United States. The term "vandalism" comes from the Vandals, one of the barbarian tribes who ransacked Rome, and the term "vandal" applies especially well to those who, in the name of a highly intolerant "tolerance" and a very narrow "diversity," are trying to wipe out of existence a culture, a way of life, and a portion of our history.

This has a specific focus, now, on the Confederate memorial in Arlington National Cemetery. This cemetery, which occupies land that rightfully belongs to the heirs of Robert E. Lee (the United States unilaterally confiscated the place just because Gen. Lee dared to differ with the views of the ruling elites), has a Confederate section, and a Confederate monument, because past generations recognized that both sides fought for what they believed was right, both sides included very courageous people, and both sides needed reconciliation. No matter what some people - in their ignorance of history - claim, that monument has nothing to do with racism. A Jew designed it - which is only fitting, since the first Jewish cabinet officer in the United States was Judah P. Benjamin, who served in the Confederate cabinet. Confederate soldiers were brown and black as well as white - there were thousands of blacks who volunteered to serve, not just in labor capacities as the north tried to restrict them to, but armed and fighting soldiers, in integrated units. Witnesses who were no friends of the Confederate States of America testified to the presence of armed black Confederate soldiers, fighting by the side of white Confederate soldiers. There were Hispanic officers and men in the Confederate States Army. There were American Indian officers and men on the Confederate side - indeed, the last Confederate general to surrender was Stand Watie, the principal chief of the Cherokee Nation.

In light of these historical, documented facts, to claim that the Confederate memorial in Arlington National Cemetery stands for racism or "white supremacy" is to at best evince vast historical ignorance, and at worst demonstrate a maniacal tendency to tell deliberate lies in the pursuit of a dictatorial political agenda. One hopes that it is the former motivation which has moved the current attempt at official vandalism, and not the latter; one hesitates to think so ill of anyone as to believe that he would consciously spread vicious untruths about others just to achieve his political goals.

In any event, on these factual and rational grounds, I vehemently oppose any attempt, or any considerate of such an attempt, to dismantle or otherwise do harm to the Arlington Confederate memorial. It would be a vast insult to thousands upon thousands of honest, brave men who believed they were fighting for the same liberties as the founders

of the United States fought for. It would further be an enormous insult to thousands upon thousands of people who are descended from those men, and to millions of honest southerners who hate racism, who hate bigotry, but recognize that the Confederate States of America are part of their heritage and their history.

I urge you, sir, to use every means at your disposal to stand against this proposed act of barbaric violence to history and to the memory of good men.



As a proud American, retired Naval Officer and life member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, I am outraged that the federal "Naming Commission," established by Congress in 2021, has now recommended that the Confederate Memorial located in the Confederate Section of Arlington National Cemetery be removed.

The memorial was dedicated on June 4, 1914, as part of America's continued effort to reunify the United States in the post-war era. Unfortunately, the Naming Commission has seen fit to recommend its removal and therefore the desecration of this honorable grave marker.

Quoting from a September 16th article in THE FEDERALIST,

"The memorial's central figure is a woman, meant to represent the South, crowned with an olive wreath, a symbol of peace. In her extended left hand is a laurel wreath and in her right hand is a pruning hook, which rests upon a plow. Under the figure is an inscription, a quote from the Book of Isaiah, "And they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks." That is to say, the monument's central theme is reconciliation and peace — beating swords into ploughshares [emphasis added]. It commends the South for turning away from war while also honoring their war dead."

This recommendation is divisive, extreme and serves no realistic purpose. As such, it epitomizes the complete lack of respect for the over 400 Confederate service members, their wives, and Confederate civilians buried at Arlington who are also American veterans, as enacted by Congress in 1958.
