
Individual Burial Markers

<u>Markers</u> – A headstone, foot stone, niche cover, flat marker, or private headstone/marker, as applicable, containing inscriptions commemorating one or more decedents interred at that location.

<u>Private Headstone or Markers</u> – A headstone or individual memorial marker provided at private expense, in lieu of a headstone or individual memorial marker furnished by the Government.

Installation of private markers, which have no specified dimensions, is only authorized by exception in sections established for private markers prior to 1947. As of January 2018, Army National Military Cemeteries do not permit the installation of private markers in any section. See Major General Wheeler's marker in the top right.

Variations exist for upright Civil War U.S. and Confederate markers and for flat markers.





Individual Memorial Markers

<u>Memorial Markers (also referred to as Cenotaphs)</u> – A headstone used to memorialize service members or veterans...

- Who are missing in action;
- Whose remains have not been recovered or identified;
- Whose remains were buried at sea, whether by the member's or veteran's own choice or otherwise;
- Whose remains were donated to science; or
- Whose remains were cremated and the cremated remains were scattered without interment or inurnment of any portion of those remains.

These requirements are identified in 32 CFR § 553.16, derived from 38 USC § 2409.

Memorial markers are denoted by the phrase "In Memory of" per Army Regulation 290-5, derived from 32 CFR § 553.27.

Memorials


<u>Memorials</u> – Structures placed at or near a larger group of those who lost their lives during a specific event or conflict.

Between December 1899 and May 1921, the practice of placing memorials collocated with the dead they represent became common at Arlington National Cemetery.

For example, memorials were created for the Spanish-American War dead in Section 22, the dead of the USS Maine in Section 24, and the Spanish-American War nurses in Section 21.

A legislative directive to relocate all Confederate dead to a single section of Arlington, now Section 16, was followed by the establishment of a grand memorial in this tradition.


This trend concluded with the burials of repatriated soldiers from World War I in Sections 18 and 19.






Monuments, Past and Present

<u>Monuments</u> – Monuments or other structures or landscape features that serve to honor events in history, units of the Armed Forces, individuals, or groups of individuals that served in the Armed Forces, and that do not contain human remains or mark the location of remains in close proximity.



Chaplains Hill

(Modifications to the Protestant and Catholic Monuments)

Advisory Committee on Arlington National Cemetery

8 November 2022



The Law - 38 USC § 2409

(a) The Secretary of the Army may set aside, when available, a suitable area or areas in Arlington National Cemetery, Virginia, to honor the memory of members of the Armed Forces and veterans-

(1) who are missing in action;

(2) whose remains have not been recovered or identified;

(3) whose remains were buried at sea, whether by the member's or veteran's own choice or otherwise;

(4) whose remains were donated to science; or

(5) whose remains were cremated and whose ashes were scattered without interment of any portion of the ashes.

(b)

(1) Under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Army and subject to paragraph (2), appropriate memorials or markers may be erected in Arlington National Cemetery to honor the memory of those individuals, or group of individuals, referred to in subsection (a) of this section.

(2)

(A) Except for a monument containing or marking interred remains, no monument (or similar structure, as determined by the Secretary of the Army in regulations) may be placed in Arlington National Cemetery except pursuant to the provisions of this subsection.

(B) A monument may be placed in Arlington National Cemetery if the monument commemorates-

(i) the service in the Armed Forces of the individual, or group of individuals, whose memory is to be honored by the monument; or

(ii) a particular military event.

(C) No monument may be placed in Arlington National Cemetery until the end of the 25-year period beginning-

(i) in the case of the commemoration of service under subparagraph (B)(i), on the last day of the period of service so commemorated; and

(ii) in the case of the commemoration of a particular military event under subparagraph (B)(ii), on the last day of the period of the event.

(D) A monument may be placed only in those sections of Arlington National Cemetery designated by the Secretary of the Army for such placement and only on land the Secretary determines is not suitable for burial.

(E) A monument may only be placed in Arlington National Cemetery if an appropriate nongovernmental entity has agreed to act as a sponsoring organization to coordinate the placement of the monument and-

(i) the construction and placement of the monument are paid for only using funds from private sources;

(ii) the Secretary of the Army consults with the Commission of Fine Arts and the Advisory Committee on Arlington National Cemetery before approving the design of the monument; and

(iii) the sponsoring organization provides for an independent study on the availability and suitability of alternative locations for the proposed monument outside of Arlington National Cemetery.

(3)

(A) The Secretary of the Army may waive the requirement under paragraph (2)(C) in a case in which the monument would commemorate a group of individuals who the Secretary determines-

(i) has made valuable contributions to the Armed Forces that have been ongoing and perpetual for longer than 25 years and are expected to continue on indefinitely; and

(ii) has provided service that is of such a character that the failure to place a monument to the group in Arlington National Cemetery would present a manifest injustice.

(B) If the Secretary waives such requirement under subparagraph (A), the Secretary shall-

(i) make available on an Internet website notification of the waiver and the rationale for the waiver; and

(ii) submit to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the Senate and the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the House of Representatives written notice of the waiver and the rationale for the waiver.

(4) The Secretary of the Army shall provide notice to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the Senate and the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the House of Representatives of any monument proposed to be placed in Arlington National Cemetery. During the 60-day period beginning on the date on which such notice is received, Congress may pass a joint resolution of disapproval of the placement of the monument. The proposed monument may not be placed in Arlington National Cemetery until the later of-

(A) if Congress does not pass a joint resolution of disapproval of the placement of the monument, the date that is 60 days after the date on which notice is received under this paragraph; or

(B) if Congress passes a joint resolution of disapproval of the placement of the monument, and the President signs a veto of such resolution, the earlier of-


(i) the date on which either House of Congress votes and fails to override the veto of the President; or


(ii) the date that is 30 session days after the date on which Congress received the veto and objections of the President.


Commemorative Works Process Flow





Requests submitted to ANC are required to contain:

- A clear articulation of the purpose of the monument (*N/A for this* request this is not a new request but a modification request)
- A copy of the independent study required by law
- A copy of the architectural drawings
- Verification that the placement date is no less than 25 years following the last day of the service commemorated or SecArmy waiver request
- Indication that the construction, placement, and all supporting activities for the installation of the monument will be paid for and sustained in perpetuity from the sponsoring organization's privately-sourced funds. Certification of funds must be included (*N/A for this request - this is not a new request but a modification request*)



Protestant Chaplains Memorial Design and Overview



Purpose and Scope of Change: To preserve the monument, recommendation is to 1) move the lower plaque to the rear and emplace a new plaque containing 27 additional chaplain names; 2) replace current cement and sand backing with granite for consistency.





Military Chaplains

- Chaplains Hill is a powerful, positive symbol of American patriotism, unity and diversity.

- Four memorials commemorate the lives of Chaplains who died serving our Nation.
- In 2012, at Jewish Chaplains dedication, revealed other memorials not current.
- Protestant Memorial is not current since WWII, concrete does not match and is deteriorating unlike the other granite monuments.



- Public Law 117-81 is a "stand alone" law to update the memorials
- "Legislative Intent" was to authorize SecArmy to take necessary and prudent action to ensure monuments are updated
- Memorializes an ongoing military "group" Chaplains
 - Updates are necessary to establish generational equity
 - Updates are necessary to ensure proper memorialization

- Protestant and Roman Catholic memorials require the addition of new plaques to conform to the current "visual" of the original monument.
- All names to be added have been reviewed by the Department of Defense, the Service Chiefs of of Chaplains, Chaplain Corps historians, faith groups, and an independent historian, for completeness and accuracy.

Military Women's Memorial Renaming

- In 2021, the Women in Military Service for America Foundation renamed themselves as the Military Women's Memorial Foundation (MWMF)
- MWMF initiated dialogue with ANC to rename the Memorial the Military Women's Memorial
- After a thorough legal review, OGC determined there was no prohibition in approving this renaming
- ANMC is updating signage to reflect this revison. A temporary sign was emplaced (replacement in kind) to replace the previous sign located on Eisenhower Ave at the crosswalk (pic on the right)
- Working closely with MWM on permanent sign design to be ordered IAW Section 106 process














DoD Naming Commission and The ANC Confederate Memorial

Mission of the DoD Naming Commission:

Congressional Commission providing naming, renaming, and removal recommendations to Congress for all Department of Defense items that commemorate the Confederate States of America or any person who served voluntarily with the Confederate States of America.


- The Commission published their recommendations in three parts that can be located at: <u>www.thenamingcommission.gov</u>
- The Department of the Army conducted a study to explore alternatives ranging from leaving the memorial in place and providing contextualization (using signage and other media to provide educational opportunities for visitors) to removal. The term removal includes:
 - deconstructing, tagging and storing bronze *and* granite elements
 - deconstructing, tagging and storing bronze elements and *demolishing* granite elements
 - deconstructing, tagging and storing bronze elements *while leaving* the granite elements in place
 - *demolishing* the bronze elements while leaving the granite elements in place
 - demolishing and recycling *all* components of the memorial
 - possibly shrouding the bronze elements
- The Commissioners discussed at length if the proposed measures eliminated the items at issue and any disturbance to adjacent graves (there is not as the ANC has previously done work in the cemetery; in this case, the robust mitigation measures to avoid disturbing adjacent grave sites would include placing steel decking over the graves). In the case of this monument, the Commissioners assessed that contextualization was not an appropriate option.

DoD Naming Commission and The ANC Confederate Memorial Cont

- Regarding the Confederate Memorial the Commission recommended the following:
 - The statue atop of the monument should be removed. All bronze elements on the monument should be deconstructed, and removed, preferably leaving the granite base and foundation in place to minimize risk of inadvertent disturbance of graves.
 - The work should be planned and coordinated with the Commission of Fine Arts and the Historical Review Commission to determine the best way to proceed with removal of the monument.
 - The Department of Army should consider the most cost-effective method of removal and disposal of the monument's elements in their planning.
 - The Commission recommends the Secretary of Defense authorize Directors of all Defense entities and organizations rename Defense assets under their control that commemorate the Confederacy or individuals who voluntarily served with the Confederacy. This includes all assets identified on the Defense inventory list to include buildings, streets, and digital assets.
 - Roads on ANC bearing the names Lee and Jackson fall under this recommendation.
- 06 October 2022 Secretary of Defense Austin directed implementation of DoD Naming Commission Recommendations






Confederate Memorial – Basic Information

- ANC is a Historic District under the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). The Confederate Memorial is a contributing element to the ANC Historic District and, under current law, any decision to remove it must be conducted IAW the NHPA Section 106 process.
- In 1900, Congress authorized Confederate remains to be reinterred at ANC in a designated section (Section 16). ANC already held other Confederate graves.
- In 1906, in the spirit of reconciliation, Secretary of War William H. Taft approved a request by the United Daughters of the Confederacy (UDC), a women's group dedicated to propagating a sanitized, sentimental version of the Confederacy, to erect a memorial to the Confederate dead in Section 16. President Woodrow Wilson dedicated it in 1914.
- Other ANC burial sections have memorials erected to honor the dead (the Spanish American War, USS Maine, and Nurses sections).






Historical Context

- Close to the nation's capital and on the former slave plantation owned by Robert E. Lee's wife, and where Freedmen's Village was established during the war, ANC held special significance for the UDC.
- The ANC Confederate Memorial formed part of a larger effort to rewrite history and falsely portray the Confederacy as a noble "Lost Cause" during the late 19th and early 20th centuries, and beyond. The sculptural elements depicted attempt to sanitize the history of the Civil War.



Pictured above: The Latin "Victrix Causa Diis Placuit Sed Victa Catoni" translates to: "The Victorious Cause was Pleasing to the Gods, but the Lost Cause to Cato"

Cato was a Roman statesmen noted for his moral integrity






Confederate Memorial: Imagery

This memorial contains problematic imagery that depicts false, nostalgic narratives about the Confederacy and racially offensive images of African Americans. It aligned with the effort to manipulate the national memory of the Civil War by eliminating slavery as the war's cause and sanitizing the practice of slavery.










- Previous Interpretive Efforts:
 - Starting in 2017, ANC developed plans for comprehensive Education and Interpretation Programs.
 - These programs were implemented in 2019. They include a long-term Interpretive Master Plan—a blueprint for how to approach interpretation projects, including those of a sensitive nature.
- Current Interpretation Projects:
 - From the outset, the ANC Interpretation Program designated the Confederate Memorial/Section 16 as a high-priority project.
 - Confederate Memorial webpage update completed in Dec. 2019.
 - Released the African American History at ANC Education Module in 2020 as part of our larger effort to more prominently interpret African American history at ANC and contextualize ANC's Civil War history.
 - Interpretative Signage: developed a four-step plan, based on industry best practices:
 - 1) Graphic branding/structural design
 - 3) Stakeholder engagement

- 2) Research/development/planning (incl. Section 106 review)
- 4) Design, manufacture, and installation

- Planned Interpretive Signage Projects:
 - Interpretative Signage: Following our four-step plan, once current research is complete, the next step will involve open engagement and collaboration with a wide variety of stakeholders, community members, and experts.
 - Confederate Memorial/Section 16: Develop panels to accurately interpret these sites within the context of Civil War memory and the larger landscape of ANC.
 - Freedman's Village and Syphax Family Property: as per the Southern Expansion MOA, interpret the site of the Freedman's Village and Syphax family property (formerly enslaved family at the Arlington Estate)
- Way Ahead
 - National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) Process
 - Advisory Committee Input on Road Naming






Southern Expansion Roads to be Named





Scheduling Limitations

- Conduct 4 services per hour (constrained by privacy and resources)
- Four chapel services per day
- Eight Military Funeral Honors w/Escort per day (Caisson)
- USN averages 20 blocks per month due to other NCR obligations
- USAF blocks services on Tuesdays
- USN, USMC, USCG don't have Catholic Chaplains on Fridays
- Every first Tuesday of the month is half day (training and maintenance for all branches of service)
- Approximately 1700 cases rescheduled in FY 20-21 due to COVID-19
- 30% turn over within Interment Services
